

Reading Between the Lines: The importance of Eliade's correspondence¹

Mircea Eliade's correspondence has had a very important role in revealing both personal details of the author's life and his intellectual development. This paper analyzes aspects of the correspondence between Mircea Eliade and his friends, students, colleagues, and Jewish intellectuals.
